A little bit of Background Info:

Our Sonday Curriculum (reading intervention curriculum for elementary) is organized as follows:

-5 Pre-Reading Levels that focus on alphabet knowledge, rhyming and more

-36 Reading Levels which cover various phonics skills and high frequency words.

As groups master all skills in the current level they are moved up to the next level within the curriculum.

All groups have shown measurable growth in just a few weeks by either gaining skills within their current level or moving ahead to the next level. We are incredibly proud of our SOAR students for their hard work!

### **Community Engagement:**

- Acton-Agua Dulce Unified School District is in the process of bringing together a group of teachers, students, parents, and community advocates to be part of our "Showcase Shadow Days" Collaborative.

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### **COVID Report:**

- I'd like to provide an up to date COVID report, data pulled from LACDPH. 679 news cases as reported to LACDPH for October 25<sup>th</sup> as compared to 742 new cases for October 15<sup>th</sup> as reported at our last board meeting.

The testing positivity rate a 7-day average for the week of October 18<sup>th</sup> is .82% as compared to the week of October 5<sup>th</sup> which came in at .93% .

The percentage of individuals tested with a diagnostic COVID test since the week of October 18<sup>th</sup> comes in at 145,254 compared to the week of October 5<sup>th</sup> comes in at 142,722.

- I'd like to share an infographic on the screen that was pushed out to all families last week to help outline the COVID exposure timeline and parameters. Thank you Nurse Cari Wright for the following information. Some of the highlights include:

## Does this student meet the criteria of a close contact?

- *The student was within 6 feet of someone with Covid-19 for a total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period.*
- *The person had unprotected contact with bodily fluids and/or secretions. (Shared eating utensils, kissed, coughed on, sneezed on, provided care to someone with C19 without proper protective equipment).*
- *A person is considered to be infectious and able to spread the virus to others from 2 days before symptoms first started until the isolation period ends (i.e. 10 days have passed since symptoms first started AND no fever for at least 24 hours AND symptoms improve); OR, if symptoms never develop, from 2 days before their positive test was taken until 10 days after that test was taken.*

## If the student tested positive within the past 90-days

- *The student may return to school immediately, no testing required.*

## If the student is Vaccinated

- *Asymptomatic*
  - *The student may return to school immediately. It is recommended the student test for Covid-19 on day 6.*
- *Symptomatic*
  - *The student tests for Covid-19.*
    - *Negative – Student returns to school once they are symptom free for 24 hours without medication.*
    - *Positive – Student may return on day 11 if symptoms have not been present for 24 hours without medication.*

## **Unvaccinated students**

(do not meet criteria of box 1 or 2)

### **Begin Quarantine**

- Asymptomatic
  - Recommended to test for Covid-19
    - Student does not test
      - Students remain home for 10-days and may return if symptoms did not develop during quarantine.
    - Student is tested on Day 6
      - Negative – may return to class on day 8 if student remained asymptomatic.
      - Positive – Student begins their isolation period.
- Symptomatic
  - Recommended the student get tested right away and then again on day 6 to determine if symptoms are related to Covid-19.
