NOVEMBER 1ST, PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT HIGHLIGHTS


Trauma Informed Care was introduced to staff as an overarching umbrella to MTSS (Multi-Tiered Systems of Support) and PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports).

Children's reactions to trauma can interfere considerably with learning and behavior at school. Schools serve as a critical system of support for children who have experienced trauma. Administrators, teachers, and staff can help reduce the effects of trauma on children by recognizing trauma responses, accommodating and responding to traumatized students within the classroom.

Decades of research and studies have established that children who experience adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) not only are more likely to exhibit negative behaviors at school, but are more likely to develop risky behaviors.

They are more likely to face a host of negative health consequences over their lifetimes, including reduced life expectancy. Data from the 2016 National Survey of Children's Health (NSCH) showed that 46 percent of America's children had experienced at least one adverse childhood experience with the number rising to 55 percent for children aged 12 to 17. One in five U.S. children had two or more ACEs.

Mr. James Klipfel, keynote speaker kicked off the morning with a motivational message. Mr. Klipfel is the California Teacher of the Year recipient for 2021.

These work-based and problem-solving units will provide students an opportunity to hone in on their interests and skills.



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

Vision and Hearing Screenings

- Starting this week students have begun to get vision and hearing testing.
 - Vision screenings are done for grades TK/K, 2, 5, 8, Special Education students, and all referrals.
 - Hearing screenings are done for TK/K, 2, 5, 8, 10, Special Education students, and all referrals.



Covid Quarantine Guidelines

Identifying Exposures On Campus - Close Contacts to a Confirmed Case

Does this student meet the criteria of a close contact?

- The student was within 6 feet of someone with Covid-19 for a total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period.
- The person had unprotected contact with bodily fluids and/or secretions. (Shared eating utensils, kissed, coughed on, sneezed on, provided care to someone with C19 without proper protective equipment).
- A person is considered to be infectious and able to spread the virus to others from 2 days before symptoms first started until the isolation period ends (i.e. 10 days have passed since symptoms first started AND no fever for at least 24 hours AND symptoms improve); OR, if symptoms never develop, from 2 days before their positive test was taken until 10 days after that test was taken.

If the student tested positive within the past 90-days

- The student may return to school immediately, no testing required.

If the student is Vaccinated

- Asymptomatic
 - The student may return to school immediately. It is recommended the student test for Covid-19 on day 6.
- Symptomatic
 - The student tests for Covid-19.
 - Negative – Student returns to school once they are symptom free for 24 hours without medication.
 - Positive – Student may return on day 11 if symptoms have not been present for 24 hours without medication.

Unvaccinated students

(do not meet criteria of box 1 or 2)

Begin Quarantine

- Asymptomatic
 - Recommended to test for Covid-19
 - Student does not test
 - Students remain home for 10-days and may return if symptoms did not develop during quarantine.
 - Student is tested on Day 6
 - Negative – may return to class on day 8 if student remained asymptomatic.
 - Positive – Student begins their isolation period.
- Symptomatic
 - Recommended the student get tested right away and then again on day 6 to determine if symptoms are related to Covid-19.
