
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## Fall reflection

## High Desert MS

#### S - Strive to Be Your Best

With a year of isolation and distance learning behind us, High Desert teachers and students are finding ways to make meaningful connections as we return back to school. Ms. Trusel changed up her morning time block this year to include "Morning Meetings" that utilizing children's books. The goal of the morning meeting is to promote a climate of trust, academic growth, and positive behavior by beginning each day with a whole class gathering. The first theme was belonging. The teacher reads along with the students varied stories about students who struggle to belong in different situations. One little girl struggled because she did not look like other members of her family. In another book, the little boy did not fit in at school. Students are able to talk about the experiences of the characters in the story while also reflecting and applying the situations to those in their own lives. Morning meetings foster social-emotional growth, connectedness, and the building of a respectful, responsive classroom community.

#### O - Own Your Actions

Building community is also about teamwork. Ms. Alford Walsh and her students took on the Marshmallow Tower Design Challenge. Students worked together to build the tallest, free-standing structure in just 18 minutes using no more than 20 sticks of spaghetti and 20 minimarshmallows. Students owned their actions as they used the design process to plan, implement, revise, and rebuild over and over until they had a design that literally rose up to the challenge. Students understood that some materials are stronger than others and that tension can affect stability and cause the structure to break. They also came to learn that even weak materials can be made stronger with good design techniques. These are all life lessons and parts of the scientific design process that helped our 7th and 8th grade science students reconnect, build a foundation and grow together as a reunited group.

#### A - Act Responsibly

The Acton Town Council and the Acton Agua Dulce Community have been working hard over the past few years to ensure that High Desert students have a safe path to and from school. Their efforts have included the paved path to the library, the addition of the crossing guard, and the addition of the trees lining Crown Valley Rd. just to name a few of the projects they have worked on.

#### R - Respect All

Students in Mr. Rowland's class return to school and found a friend waiting for them to "adopt" (stuffed toy dogs). The students made dog houses for them and they are their little buddy pets that can come to class with them since their real pets have to stay at home and can't do school with them anymore (from Distance Learning). The students named their new pets, created homes for them, and even "fed'" them with coins. Similar to the way students are welcomed into class for the new school year, these pets helped them to feel welcome, provide comfort and friendship, and remind them of the importance of continuing to grow through good nutrition. Now on display in class, the dog patrol welcomes the students each day and brings a little bit of companionship and home into the classroom.
